2025 marks a very special milestone for Cancer Council Tasmania, our 30-year anniversary.

A brief history

In the early 1990s, there were several volunteer cancer support groups active across Tasmania. In partnership with the government of the day, a decision was made to create one organisation for the benefit of all Tasmanians whose lives were impacted by cancer.

A Board was appointed, premises were secured in Liverpool Street, Hobart and three staff members started work, including our founding CEO, the late Lawson Ride. The organisation was incorporated on **28 June 1995**.

Relay For Life was launched in **2000**, and our transport2treatment service commenced in **2006** with two vehicles. Quit Tasmania was welcomed into Cancer Council Tasmania in **2012**, and in the same year our purpose-built Northern Cancer Support Centre was opened. Our Southern Cancer Support Centre followed in **2018**, and not long after in **2020**, our Clothes4Cancer Opportunity Shop opened in East Devonport.

Where we are today - with thanks to you

We have come a long way since opening our doors in 1995, growing to a statewide organisation with over 45 staff and

500 volunteers. Supportive care staff are now present at all major private and public hospitals across Tasmania and our transport to treatment fleet has increased to nine vehicles.

Our work has extended further into the community, providing support and information to more cancer patients, families, carers and practitioners than ever before.

Our prevention work, including community education on how to reduce cancer risk through lifestyle changes, is reaching tens of thousands of Tasmanians every year through our SunSmart program, Quit Tasmania's media campaigns and the Quitline service, and promotion of key messages on the importance of early detection and screening. With a commitment to investing into cancer research, we have now exceeded \$7 million in grants to local researchers, working on clinical drug trials and funding a number of academic research scholarships.

What hasn't changed over this time, is our mission to reduce the incidence and impact of all cancers for all Tasmanians. There are many people to thank - because while Cancer Council Tasmania is the face of the services and programs that benefit thousands of Tasmanians impacted by cancer every year – this is only made possible through the collective efforts and generosity of many, many people over the last 30 years.

From our staff, volunteers, researchers, supporters, sponsors, clients and their families - we thank everyone who has assisted us along the way, and we look forward to continuing working together towards a cancer-free future.

The celebrations won't end there, with Quit Tasmania also celebrating their 30th anniversary this year. While Quit Tasmania has been an important part of Cancer Council Tasmania since 2012, they have been working hard to reduce the harms of smoking in our community since 1995.

People will often hear me say that Cancer Council Tasmania is an incredible community organisation delivering programs and services in our community, for our community because of our community.

I believe this wholeheartedly, and I look forward to celebrating these milestones with you all in the months ahead.

Three decades of Quit Tasmania

Smoking rates in Tasmania are at their lowest point in history, a remarkable achievement made possible by a comprehensive suite of tobacco control measures like plain packaging, graphic health warnings on cigarette packs, tax increases, smoke-free areas and advertising bans.

For 30 years, Quit Tasmania has delivered hard-hitting mass media campaigns, advocated for stronger laws to protect Tasmanians, supported thousands of Tasmanians to quit through Quitline 13 7848, and trained hundreds of service providers to better support their clients to quit smoking. Many will remember impactful campaigns like Never Give Up Giving Up, 16 Cancers or our locally developed Think. We've also engaged with thousands of Tasmanians, from people who currently smoke to young people, to shape our important work and a Tasmania free from tobacco-related harm.

With the rise of e-cigarettes (vapes) over the last decade, Quit Tasmania has also advocated for regulation to protect Tasmanians from the harms of nicotine addiction and the toxic chemicals in vapes. We welcomed the 2024 national legislation that ensures vapes are not readily available to young people and people who don't smoke, limiting their availability to pharmacies.

So, what's next for 2025?

Keep an eye out for youth-focused anti-vaping campaign, Don't Let Vaping In and Worried About You, our anti-tobacco campaign focused on the impact that smoking can have on loved ones.

QUITLINE TASMANIA

We're expanding our services with extended hours (8am-8pm, Monday to Friday), and new counsellors, with a wealth of knowledge and experience, particularly to support young people on their quitting journey.



Keeping you SunSmart

Australia has one of the highest rates of skin cancer in the world, with the majority of skin cancers being caused by overexposure to ultraviolet radiation (UV) from the sun. The good news is you can reduce your risk by being SunSmart whenever the UV is 3 and above and you are heading outside. In Tasmania this is from the beginning of September through to the end of April, however for outdoor workers, year-round protection is required.

SunSmart Schools and Early Childhood Program



30 years ago, the SunSmart in Schools and Early Childhood Program in Tasmania was yet to be established. Today, 95% of primary schools, 62% of K-10/12 schools, 50% of secondary schools and 90% of early childhood services are members of the program and have a policy and strategies in place to protect students and staff from the harmful effects of UV exposure.

UV protection in childhood and adolescents significantly reduces skin cancer risk later in life. Implementing policy, practical strategies, education and role modelling all play a major role.

We celebrate the progress made and the schools and services that have championed sun safety in their broader communities, and we will continue to support all schools to create a safe place for children to play and learn.

Driving growth in transport2treatment

Our transport2treatment service (t2t) has been providing vital patient transport to and from cancer treatments and changing people's lives since 2006. t2t is a no-cost service, made possible by fundraising and donations and a wonderful team of volunteer drivers.

Last financial year our drivers covered 325,000 kms, that's equivalent to driving around the world more than 8 times.

Cancer Support Groups changing lives since 1996

We recently had the privilege of meeting Harry who was involved in setting up the first Prostate Cancer Support group in 1996. Harry told us that when he was diagnosed with an aggressive form of prostate cancer in 1995 there was hardly any support, the only information available was one pamphlet written by the Rotary Club. We certainly have come a long way since then!

Harry worked with Cancer Council Tasmania staff to set up the first prostate cancer support group in Hobart. The first meeting was held at Hadley's Orient Hotel in Hobart with around 12 people attending, growing into an ongoing monthly support group with anywhere between 4 and 12 people in attendance.

Harry said "overall, it was a support both ways; my support to others and their support to me. We were able to talk about treatments and what the different doctors were

offering. Generally, we met wherever the Cancer Council office was, we had no structure, we just met and spokeit used to be an encouragement, a jovial group, even when we lost people [over time]. It also wasn't for everyone, some men found that talking about their diagnosis was hard and they didn't come back."

Almost 30 years later a lot has changed but a lot has stayed the same. We still have an active monthly prostate support group in Hobart, men's support groups in Launceston and Devonport, plus a wide range of other groups. We also have access to information about specific cancer types and the impact of cancer on finances and wellbeing.
