Message from the CEO and President

The 2019-20 financial year could be described using many adjectives including challenging, amazing, innovative and in many cases, successful. Like other businesses, we have been impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. However, we have been encouraged by a range of new initiatives, which have ensured our ongoing service delivery to Tasmanians.

In particular, our cancer support team provided nearly 7,500 occasions of support, despite the closure of our cancer support centres in March 2020. A number of new online initiatives were progressed with programs such as mindfulness, yoga and tai chi being provided to clients around the state. Increased telephone calls also ensured that people impacted by cancer could be supported.

Our t2t service continued to assist many Tasmanians in getting to and from their cancer treatment appointments. The COVID-19 restrictions reduced the number of clients who could be transported at any one time, however with the assistance of our wonderful volunteer drivers the service continued to assist many people over the course of the year.

We are very thankful, as are our clients, for all the volunteer drivers who continue to support the t2t program, as we could not operate the service without them.

The Find Cancer Early program was one of the key components of cancer prevention which had great engagement with the community and anecdotally we know it has had a positive impact on the lives of some people. During the year the team continued working with the broader community through their presentations and interactions with schools, local organisations and businesses with new ways of engagement developed that ensured our important messages on how to reduce your cancer risk continued.

Tasmania's smoking rates are still exceptionally high but are on the decline due to the continued efforts and initiatives of the Quit Tasmania team. New targeted social marketing activities, increased connections with community organisations through the 'Supporting People to Stop Smoking' program, and the provision of nicotine replacement therapy funded predominantly from a Healthy Tasmania Grant, are all having significant smoking cessation outcomes.

CCT's investment into cancer research continued which is now in excess of \$5.5 million over the past 25 years. There was an additional number of small research grants provided due to the generosity of auction bids at our gala events, investment continued into clinical trials, and the ongoing provision of academic scholarships ensured that Tasmanian based researchers were able to continue their great work and contribute to our vision of a cancer free future. The Public Talk series initiated in the prior year continued with two talks in the south and one in the north of the state, all well attended and appreciated by the audience.

CCT was honoured to have the Premier, the Hon Peter Gutwein MP launch the CCT Future Fund, a new initiative seeking funds to secure the sustainability of CCT for the future. Every Tasmanian has a cancer story and we were

privileged to have the Premier share his story with us.

The reliance on the public for over 90% of our funds continues to be a challenge and even more difficult in our current environment. However, the marketing and fundraising team are up for that challenge. Even though CCT had to make the difficult decision to cancel five of the six planned Relay For Life events earlier this year, the ongoing engagement with the public, sponsors and partners has been really encouraging. We are now hopeful of being able to hold a number of fundraising events later in 2020 that were postponed due to COVID-19. The events that we did hold were all extremely successful and well attended, with our emergency appeal being one of the most successful appeals CCT has ever undertaken.

Volunteers are extremely important to CCT and assist us in many aspects of the business and it was a pleasure to be able to give Outstanding Service Awards and Years of Service certificates to many of our volunteers this year. Our volunteers help us at our support centres, as t2t drivers, committees, daffodil day stall holders and in many other ways. Thank you all so much.

CCT continues to be well governed and we are thankful to the Board Directors, also volunteers, who ensure that CCT remains a credible organisation. We are also thankful for the support they give to the organisation outside of their board duties. During the year, Mai Frandsen resigned and we thank her for her contributions to the Board and the Scientific and Research Committee.

We are also extremely thankful to the dedicated CCT employees who had to deal with many changes and challenges this financial year. Their ability to work together and focus on our Mission to minimise the impact and incidence of cancer on all Tasmanians ensures that we did achieve positive outcomes and we thank them enormously for their passion, energy and continued contribution.

Thank you. Stay safe everyone and we look forward to your continued support in 2020-21.

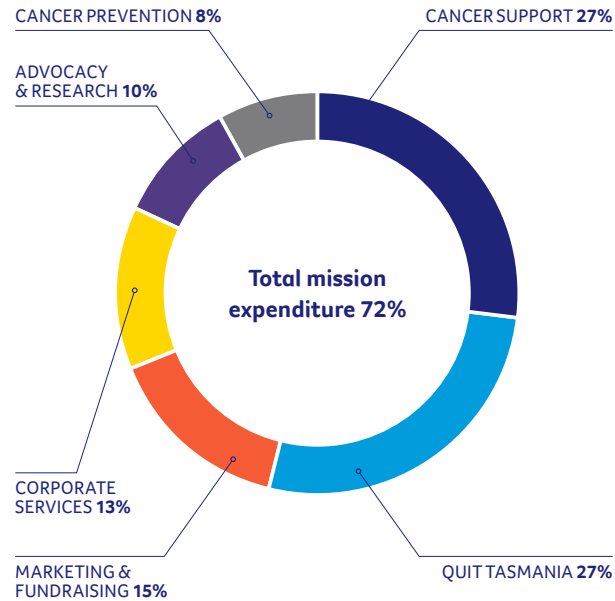

Cancer Research and Scholarships

Every day, our best and brightest cancer researchers are working towards a cancer-free future. Thanks to the generous support of the Tasmanian community, we've been able to fund research into every stage of cancer control from understanding cancer, preventing cancer, to saving and extending lives.

Over the past financial year, we've invested over **\$200,000** into cancer research including:

- Investment into clinical trials
- Awarding 4 small research grants:
 - Elizabeth Molloy Memorial Cancer Research Grant recipient - Dr Kate Brettingham-Moore, 'Understanding Response to Radiotherapy'.

Over the years, Cancer Council Tasmania has funded the clinical trials of 30 cancer-fighting drugs, which have successfully made their way onto the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme (PBS).

Seize the Day Educational Scholarships

Our Seize the Day Educational Scholarships are offered each year to young Tasmanians impacted by cancer to assist with post-secondary study or training costs. Our scholarship recipients have either undergone treatment for their own cancer diagnosis, cared for a family member with cancer, or have been bereaved by cancer.

In the past financial year, we awarded 37 scholarships worth a total of \$35,000. Scholarships are allocated by a panel of UTAS, TasTAFE and Cancer Council Tasmania staff who consider the impact of cancer on each applicant. All applicants are offered information and support with their cancer experience. Our Seize the Day Educational Scholarships are made possible thanks to our corporate sponsors: Cape Hope Foundation, 7AD FM, SEA FM's Koinz4Kids, and Huon Aquaculture.

Where does the money go?

Cancer Support Services

Over nine Tasmanians are diagnosed with cancer every day, with over 3,350 Tasmanians receiving a cancer diagnosis each year. The impact of that diagnosis is far greater than the individual, which is why Cancer Council Tasmania is here for all Tasmanians impacted by cancer.

The cancer support centres at Devonport, Launceston and Hobart provide support to many Tasmanians with a broad range of services and programs available. With one in three cancers being preventable, Cancer Prevention Education Programs are integral to ensuring all Tasmanians are aware of how to minimise the risk of cancer on themselves and their families.

From March 2020, we had to close our cancer support centres and cancel face-to-face support appointments and programs due to COVID-19. Many of our complementary therapies were offered online and our Wig Library moved to a postal-based service. Our staff have been busy with increased phone and online support appointments, and we have slowly reintroduced face-to-face support by appointment only whilst maintaining a COVID-safe environment for clients and staff.

Our supportive care services and programs are delivered across our three cancer support centres at no cost to the public.

- **24,817** cancer support information resources were distributed.
- **7,439** occasions of support provided (including one-on-one support, group supports and support programs). **1,126** occasions of one-to-one support were with new clients.

- **423** clients received a total of over \$96,000 in financial support, in partnership with Aurora Energy and Telstra.
- **420** people attending Mindfulness sessions.
- Assisted **26** young people with cancer and their families with over \$22,000 from the 'Rachel & Jye' Fund.



- **205** calls to our 13 11 20 Cancer Support and Information Line to speak to an Oncology Registered Nurse.
- **175** clients accessing our Centrelink Program.
- **158** wigs borrowed from our three wig libraries.
- **127** clients receiving Oncology Massage including Bowen Therapy.
- **250** people accessed Cancer Council's Complementary Therapies across the state.

RACHEL & JYE FUND

The Rachel & Jye Fund was established by two families whose children, Rachel and Jye, died after being diagnosed with leukaemia. The aim of the fund is to provide financial assistance to Tasmanian families where a child or adolescent, up to and including 18 years of age, is diagnosed with cancer and/or experiences a relapse. The fund also supports the family when their child needs to receive their cancer treatment interstate.

What are Complementary Therapies?

Complementary Therapies are used alongside conventional medicines and treatments. Mindfulness, Tai Chi and Yoga are just some of the Complementary Therapies the Cancer Support Centre offer on a regular basis. These therapies can help people with their cancer experience and research shows that two out of three people with cancer use at least one form of complementary therapy during or after their cancer treatment.

Where does the money go?

Cancer Prevention Education Programs

The Cancer Prevention team focuses on providing evidence-based health education that helps Tasmanians reduce their cancer risk. The team delivers vital cancer prevention information and resources to schools and early childhood centres, workplaces, and the broader community.

This year, the team has focused on developing new and innovative ways to deliver their cancer prevention messages, which has resulted in a significant increase in the number of Tasmanians reached online. Community education sessions have continued to grow with 80% of attendees indicating they will make positive lifestyle changes to reduce their risk of cancer.

- **77,068** Tasmanians received our cancer prevention messages online.
- **2,782** cancer prevention information resources distributed.
- **4,765** Tasmanians reached at cancer prevention events and presentations.

Find Cancer Early

Cancer Council Tasmania received generous funding from the Tasmanian Government to run a 3-month cancer prevention campaign across the state. 'Find Cancer Early' was launched in January this year and urged people to 'get checked'. The focus was on bowel, skin and lung cancer, the State's most common cancers.

Find Cancer Early reached over 295,000 Tasmanians and featured on billboards, TV, radio, and online.

The campaign was a success with 71% of surveyed Tasmanians reporting an increase awareness of the signs and symptoms of cancer and over 50% reported an increased motivation to visit their doctor if they notice symptoms.

The SunSmart Schools and Early Childhood Program aims for schools and early learning services to be educated about sun protection and to minimise UV exposure by modifying behaviour and improving the environment. Evidence suggests that childhood and adolescence exposure to UV contributes significantly to the development of skin cancer later in life.

Currently, **94%** of primary schools, **45%** of secondary schools, **55%** of K-10/12 schools and **99%** of early learning services are members of the SunSmart Schools and Early Childhood Program. Based on these current membership rates, it is estimated that our program reaches over 70,000 children (and their families) across Tasmania.



Cancer Council Tasmania's transport2treatment service (t2t) provides transport support to any Tasmanian facing hardship in getting to and/or from their cancer treatment appointments.

Our t2t program is a no-cost service and is made possible thanks to our volunteers.

- Over **12,250** hours of volunteer driving.
- **395** individuals transported across Tasmania (over **260** were new clients to the service).
- **156** different Tasmanian suburbs and towns visited.
- Over **4,800** cancer treatment appointments attended.



In 2019/20 our t2t drivers drove more than 250,000 kms - that's equivalent of driving around the world over 6 times!

Where does the money go?



Quit Tasmania is a program of Cancer Council Tasmania and has been leading efforts in tobacco control since 1995 through prevention, support, research and advocacy programs. Quit Tasmania's vision is for a Tasmania that is free from tobacco and its harmful effects.

Quit's main functions include:

- Delivering anti-smoking mass media campaigns to help prevent smoking uptake and encourage Tasmanians to quit smoking.
- Providing counselling and information through the Tasmania Quitline 13 QUIT (13 7848).
- Supporting the wider Tasmanian community to build capacity for smoke-free settings and communities.

Quitline

Our professional Quitline Counsellors:

- Provided free NRT and support to **56** Tasmanians who were in government COVID-19 quarantine or self-isolation (funded by the Tasmanian Government).
- Received **717** referrals from general practitioners, nurses, community service workers and other service providers.
- Supported **732** people who self-referred to Quitline.
- Provided support and information to **2,755** Tasmanians who wanted to take the first step towards quitting smoking.
- Provided free nicotine replacement therapy (NRT) and

support to **76** Tasmanians from priority population groups through the 559 Lives Project (funded by the Healthy Tasmania Fund via the Tasmanian Government).

Community Engagement

Through our community engagement and Aboriginal Quitline Enhancement Programs, we continue to increase contact with service providers. We have:

- Engaged with over **67** service providers state-wide, including community service organisations and health professionals.
- Delivered 'Supporting People to Stop Smoking' training to over **110** community service workers.
- Distributed **4,308** smoking cessation resources and **2,085** smoking prevention resources to **88** service providers, health professionals, workplaces and people who smoke. This includes our toolkit, Help Your Clients Quit for Good, a resource for service providers who want to support people to make a quit attempt.

Mass media

- Reached **57%** of Tasmanians through our anti-smoking campaigns on television.
- The quittas.org.au website received **30,614** unique users with **38,910** sessions.
- Digital advertising campaigns have been conducted across multiple online channels to complement television advertising and achieve greater audience reach and frequency. During these campaigns, over **35,000** YouTube views were achieved and over **9,000** unique viewers.



- Quit released a new Tasmanian-made television commercial - "Think". Based on formative research conducted with Tasmanians who smoke, it identified that understanding the reasons for smoking will make people better prepared to quit smoking.
- An online quiz was developed for people who smoke to identify and understand their reasons for smoking. The quiz has been completed by over **9,606** people so far.

The Future Fund

The Future Fund was officially launched by the Premier, the Hon Peter Gutwein MP. The purpose of the Future Fund is to secure the sustainability of Cancer Council Tasmania so that in future years there will be substantial earnings, which will be reinvested back into our capacity, services and infrastructure.

It is a new initiative for Cancer Council Tasmania that focuses on long-term investment, funds invested prudently but wisely to ensure substantial growth.

The Future Fund provides an opportunity to offer major donors and philanthropists a vehicle to support the long term future of Cancer Council Tasmania. The Fund will be supplemented by the reallocation of funds received from significant bequests and cash reserves.

Expenditure from the Future Fund will be in accordance with the rules of the Future Fund, which are documented in the Cancer Council Tasmania Constitution.

The Future Fund is governed by the Cancer Council Tasmania Board and in compliance with the Cancer Council Tasmania Investment Policy.
